Thursday 6th December

Honey Buzzards in Central Scotland

The honey-buzzard is probably Scotland's most enigmatic breeding bird of prey. It is extremely difficult to observe, being rare, secretive and elusive but over the past few years two populations have been discovered in central Scotland and systematic and intensive monitoring has revealed new information about the species' annual breeding cycle. This talk will review the history and distribution of the honey-buzzard in Scotland and summarise the results of these recent studies.

Thursday 10th January

Winners and Losers: the effects of climate change on our Scottish insects

With climate change taking place what effect is this having on our insect populations. This talk will discuss how climate change will affect butterflies in particular and how will gain and some will ultimately loose in this ever-changing scenario.

Thursday 7th February

Cetaceans in the Clyde

This talk will concentrate on cetaceans in the upper Clyde and the Harbour Porpoise in particular. With recent controversy over a recent planning application to create a decommissioning port at Hunterston terminal and the noise implications with pill driving - what will happen to our marine mammals in the upper Clyde?

Thursday 7th March

Birds of Southern Spain

Birdwatching in Cadiz Province and the straits of Gibraltar

Angus will take us into the Tarifa hinterland in southern Spain, rich in breeding bird species of rocky wood country. Vultures abound here, with colonies of Griffon, Egyptian and Black.

Tarifa beach is a favourite place to see gull and tern flocks with large numbers of passage waders, and the straits of Gibraltar is well known for bird migration.

In addition this talk will discuss the larger autumn movements of storks and many species of raptor as they move south into Africa.
